Forestry workers who work alone or out of sight and sound of other crew members are more at risk – especially if there's an emergency.

Incidents and injuries can happen at any time, and when people work alone or in isolation – particularly if they can't communicate with others – any incident can quickly develop into a serious, life-threatening situation.

The ACoP states: No person is allowed "to work alone unless there is an effective means of getting help in an emergency".

If the lone crew member is injured or becomes sick, help may not get to them as quickly as needed unless the crew knows the procedures for working alone. Clear "person-check" procedures must be established and all crew reminded what to do when one of them is working alone or in isolation. All crew members must fully understand these procedures.

Person-check procedures should include the following:

- Someone is made responsible for establishing and maintaining contact with the crew member working alone
- Knowing the time intervals between checks
- Making a check at the end of the day
- Knowing what to do if the crew member doesn't respond at any time
- Using an alarm or notification method to remind crew members to call in, or that goes off if the crew member working alone doesn't check in.

Crew members working alone, and employers with workers who work alone, must take more care than ever with safety and ensure they follow safety procedures. Even with a person-check system, help could be some time away.

Know what to do: Section 12 of the Health and Safety in Employment Act 1992 says employers must make sure all workers know what to do in an emergency.

Be able to communicate: A two-way method, where the person working alone and another crew member can talk to each other, is essential.

The crew member monitoring the person working alone can be further away, but they must be able to communicate with someone who can help within 10 minutes of any alarm.

Know first aid: Anyone working alone must have a current first aid certificate and carry a personal first aid kit with them.

Be competent: Everyone working alone or in isolation must be currently competent to do the task they are doing.
